Talmud Bavli Shabbat 21b

The Gemara asks: What is Hanukkah?

When the Greeks entered the Sanctuary they defiled all the oils that were in the Sanctuary. And when the Hasmonean monarchy overcame them and emerged victorious over them, they searched and found only one cruse of oil that was placed with the seal of the High Priest. And there was sufficient oil there to light the candelabrum for only one day. A miracle occurred and they lit the candelabrum from it eight days.

"The miracle wasn't that the oil lasted an additional seven days, but rather that those ancestors lit the first wick at all, without being certain that the light would last long enough to complete the rededication of the Temple. The miracle was that they took the chance, a risk, a leap of faith. They took the first step even though they were not sure they had enough resources to succeed. What is the real miracle of Chanukah? It is the miracle of human courage that empowers us to take risks for the future even in our imperfect, uncertain world. It is the courage, even in the darkest of times, to create our own light"

In the Hanukkah blessing we thank God for the miracles or the small overcoming great powers. The Maccabeean fighting force overcame the Greek army and the tiny drop of oil overcame the laws of physics. Such seemingly impossible feats are credited to God in our recollections and our worship. Rabbi Laura Geller sees another kind of miracle—the spark of human vision and courage.

- There are many stories in which we "activate" God. We reach out and God responds.
 - Why do we need to be the agent in order for God to actualize a miracle?
 - Why does God wait for our engagement?

 - How might that play out?
 - Why also here does God wait for our engagement?
