### Midrash Tanchuma: Lech Lecha 5:4

### Psalm 92:13

The righteous bloom like a date-palm; they thrive like a cedar in Lebanon;

וְהָאֵרֶז וְהַתְּמָר מִשְׁנֻקְצָצִין, מִי יוּכַל לְעֲלוֹת בְּמִקְוֵמוֹ אֵלָא אִם כֵּן בִּיגִיעָה גְדוּלָה לְשָׁנִים הַרְבֵּה. כִּי אִם אֲבָד צְדִיק מִן הָעוֹלָם, מִי יוּכַל לְעַמֵּד בְּמִקְוֵמוֹ מִיָּד אֵלָא לְשָׁנִים הַרְבֵּה, לְפִיכָר צְדִיק כְּתִמְר יִפְרַח.

When the palm tree and the cedar are hewn down, another can be grown to replace it only with great toil over many years. Similarly, when the righteous person perishes, who can replace them immediately? Many years must first pass by. Therefore, the righteous shall flourish like a palm tree, etc.
